

Brushing Up with Rita Montrosse

WVWS Signature Member Rita Montrosse of Princeton has never been one to shy away from new challenges as part of her artistic journey. Her work ranges from representation to abstraction, and she often has experimented with mixed-media elements, including collage and gold leaf, in some of her works. Of late, Rita's new endeavors include using YUPO as the support of her painting, rather than paper.

YUPO is described by its manufacturer as synthetic paper, made from recyclable polypropylene plastic. It's water-proof, won't tear, has an ultra-smooth surface, and is made in various weights. Since it's not paper, pigments don't sink into it, but remain on the surface, leaving colors vivid and bright. Also, pigments can be easily wiped away, bringing the surface back to bright white.

YUPO's main application is in product labeling, signage, and printed items such as catalogs and menus, but watermedia artists have also made use of the product because of the unique "wet" look it exhibits -- even when paint has dried on its surface -- and because of its re-workability.

YUPO Q & A

- Q. What kinds of paint are you using with YUPO?

 A. I use watercolor, tubed acrylic and gesso.
- Q. How would you describe YUPO and in what varieties is it available (sizes, sheets, pads, etc.)?

 YUPO comes in light, medium and heavy weight.

 It comes in pads that are usually the light weight, which you can order in packs. That is what I do.

Q. What are the creative benefits you've experienced in using YUPO?

A. YUPO is slick and when painting on the surface you cannot really build up transparent layers. It is somewhat like working on hot press paper. You can correct easily by just wiping the area out.

Q. What are some of the challenges of YUPO?

A. One is not being able to build layers of color.

With acrylic you can layer, but in an opaque manner.

Q. How do you prepare YUPO for painting?

A. I try not to get fingerprints on the painting surface. I also use rubbing alcohol to clean the surface.

Q. Can you draw on YUPO? How do you get your design references in place prior to painting, or do you simply dive in?

A. Yes, you can draw on YUPO. Draw lightly. Line will be apparent when transparent color is used. But you can do a dark drawing on drawing paper and place YUPO over the sheet. The drawing will show through the YUPO and you would not have the worry of lines showing.

Metropolitan Transfer

In this watercolor on YUPO by Rita Montrosse, it's easy to see the appeal of YUPO as the pigments still look exceptionally vivid and wet, even though they are dry.

Q. Is there a particular consistency of paint that you've found is more effective for the effects you are working to achieve?

A. With the acrylic, I like the bottled acrylics by Golden (high flow acrylics). However, I have lots of tube acrylic and must use it up.

Q. What kinds of brushes/tools are you using to apply your pigments?

A. I use watercolor brushes.

Q. Do you finish or seal YUPO paintings? If so, how?

A. I do not seal because even matte medium can move the color. Many artists spray with fixative. But I use watercolor more often than acrylic, and that can also show spots even when fixative is sprayed from a distance.

Q. What considerations do you make in framing a painting on YUPO? Or do you simply treat it like watercolor paper?

A. I treat it the same as framing a watercolor on paper.

Q. What advice would you offer someone who wanted to try YUPO for the first time?

In this example of one of Rita's YUPO watercolors, you can see the lifting technique where she has created the intersecting square shapes within a block of color. She said she easily lifted those out with small flat brush.

A. Experiment and enjoy the newness of a unique surface. You can adapt almost any style and technique.

Stifel Fine Arts Center: Site of 2015



1330 National Road • Wheeling, WV 26003

ISTED ON THE National Register of Historical Places, the Stifel Fine Arts Center (known historically as the Edemar Mansion) was an elegant family home until 1976 when it was donated to Oglebay Institute for use as a public arts center.

Stifel Fine Arts Center is the headquarters for Oglebay Institute's fine arts department. Exhibits of works by local, regional, and national artists and craftspeople are displayed in the center's Hart Galleries. Art and Dance workshops and classes are also held in the century-old mansion.

Edward W. Stifel Sr. (1869–1947) built Edemar (named for his children Edward, Emily, and Mary) out of brick, steel, and concrete. Completed in 1912, the 39-room structure was meant to be fireproof. Formal gardens, a tennis court, fish pond, picnic area, putting green, and a swimming pool were located on the grounds of the several-acre estate. Stifel was president and chairman of J. L. Stifel & Sons, a textile manufacturing firm established by his grandfather, Johann Ludwig Stifel (1807–81), in 1835. Edward Stifel also promoted the cause of air travel and spearheaded the effort to build an airport in the Wheeling area. *-Janet Hart*


