

bove I have shown two website links. The first is a sub-link from the second, and it is the focus of this summary. You will find both interesting, I think, but the first is specifically focused on assisting artists to improve their skills. (The second is a list of interesting artists' websites and provides contrasts among those websites. The goal is to prompt artists to create interesting websites of their own.)

When I first visited the "art" link (the first listed link above) on the menu, I counted more than 50 lessons ranging from "How to Convey Sound in your Picture" to "Pastels, from Portraiture to Cartooning," and of course, several on "Watercolor." Most are brief step-by-step discussions of how to achieve something. Some are discussions or explanations of terminology. A couple lessons are historically significant as they detail techniques or approaches of classic painters.

Highlighted below are four of my favorites:

1) "How to Use the Rule of Thirds in Art" – The rule of thirds states:

".....that if you divide any composition into thirds, vertically and horizontally, then place the key elements of your image either along these lines or at the junctions of them, you'll achieve a more pleasing arrangement and more interesting and dynamic compositions."

In this discussion, the origin of the Rule of Thirds is explained in pictures. While it is primarily used by photographers, the author shows how to use this rule effectively in paintings landscapes, in still lifes – both symmetrical and assymetrical –and finally in placing focal points and in guiding the viewer's focus.

Page two of this section features an excellent and graphic depiction of the many applications of the rule. Even veteran painters will benefit from a review of this principle, and art teachers will find this an excellent resource for their students.

2) "Get More from your Mentor" – An excerpt from this site:

It's important not to abuse the generosity of a mentor. Marc Lewis, dean of London's School of Communication Arts says that their school is built on a model of reciprocity: "I believe that giving thanks is incredibly important. All social transactions should be fair, and ideally should be win- in." Handwritten notes feel much more personal than an email, and showing thanks is essential to maintaining a healthy relationship.

Since many of us attend workshops to get our inspiration and continuing education, perhaps our mentors are the dedicated professionals who travel around the country and bring the benefit of their expertise and experience. If so, then we should apply Marc Lewis's advice and send our appreciation to our workshop leaders in the form of written notes.

3) "Paint like an Impressionist" – by Tony Belobrajdic, Aug. 7, 2017.

In this segment, the author details "How to create a lively and spontaneous modern Impressionist scene in 10 simple steps.

Also included are the pigments and brushes used, and excellent pictures showing each step. The explanations are clear and graphic, including the four stages he uses to create a painting.

In one quote, he states, "Impressionist artwork was fresh and spontaneous, and executed with bold brushstrokes that didn't reveal too much detail." The reader can follow along as he used that bold brush to demonstrate a fresh looseness that many of us struggle to achieve.

Embedded in the text, and at the end, are links to enhance your drawing and painting.

4) "Create stunning fire effects in watercolour" – By Olga Sternyk, May 19, 2017

"Discover how to create the light, warmth and reflection of fire."

This is a 12-step process, very well presented and illustrated, to let the painter see how the illusion of fire is created by adding depth, creating shadows and using colors that suggest fire to the viewer.

If you visit the website, I would welcome your feedback, as well as citing any sites you have enjoyed and would like to share.
